MODULE DESCRIPTION

This course is a continuation of Intermediate Accounting I and II. It discusses the current solution adopted by International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) to handle financial accounting and reporting issues that have not been fully addressed in previous two intermediate accounting courses. Topics to be covered include factors affecting financial investment decisions, derivative financial instruments, foreign currency transactions, revenue recognition, accounting for deferred taxes, accounting changes and error analysis, pensions, leases, income taxes, and the statement of cash flows.
