**MODULE DESCRIPTION**

Anatomy and physiology is a compulsory course for biomedical engineering. This course is the science of studying the normal form and life activity of human body from the system, organ, cell and molecule level, combined with human anatomy and physiology. The anatomy of the human body is divided into general anatomy and histology, which is the relationship between the morphology, structure, location, and structure and function of the normal human body, and is the morphological basis of the study of physiology. Physiology is the science of studying the law of normal human life activity and physiological function, how these functions are realized and what factors they are subjected to. The course enables students to obtain human anatomy and physiology of basic theory, basic knowledge and basic skills; master the basic form and structure of each organ system, and each organ system mainly physiological process and its mechanism. The goal of this course is to provide the basics of human physiology --that is, the mechanisms by which the organ systems of the human body function, with a unique emphasis on the quantitative aspects of the human systems. Another goal of this course is to provide quantitative ways in which biomedical engineering and cell biology are being used to address problems of health and disease based on the principles of physiology.
