Description

This course begins a two-part sequence offering a general history of China from the earliest records of Chinese civilization to present. The course is introductory, has no prerequisites, and assumes no prior knowledge of China or its language. The organization of the course is basically chronological, but within that framework we will be approaching China from a wide range of viewpoints, taking up political, economic, social, religious, philosophical, and artistic developments. In this fall semester, we will cover the formation of China's social, political, and intellectual culture and its development through various dynastic regimes, up through the height of the Ch'ing [Qing] Dynasty in the late 18th century.

Learning Outcomes

The course has two basic goals: (1) to present a basic introduction to the traditions and legacies of the history and culture of China; and (2) to use the specific study of China as a means for developing more general skills in the discipline of historical analysis. By attending this course,

students are also expected to identify the main characteristics of traditional Chinese Culture, to appraise traditional Chinese culture and to reflect on the role of Chinese culture in the contemporary world.

Content

Theory (25 hours)

Topic 1 Course introduction; An overview of Chinese history (2hours)

Subtopic1. China's geography.

Question for discussion: How does geography shape Chinese civilization?

Subtopic 2. The earliest human beings in China

Peking Man and Yuanmou Man; the Upper Cave Man

The Banpo Culture, the Dawenkou Culture, the Hemudu Culture

Subtopic 3. Myths: Pangu created the world; Three August Ones and Five Emperors

Question for discussion: Why do the Chinese people call themselves the "descendents of Yandi

and Huangdi"?

Topic 2. The Earliest Chinese society: the Xia and Shang dynasties(2hours)

Question for discussion: Why the establishment of the Xia Dynasty marked a sharp change in the political system and social structure?

Subtopic 1. The Abdication System; the Hereditary System

Subtopic 2. Life of the Xia People, Erlitou, alleged capital city of Xia

Subtopic 3. Shang Dynasty: development of technology, bronze metallurgy; oracle bone script; calender;

Topic 3 The Zhou Dynasty(2hours)

Subtopic 1. The Spring and Autumn Period

Subtopic 2. The Warring States

Subtopic 3. Confucianism, Legalism, and Taoism

Question for discussion: What are Confucius's contribution to Chinese culture?

Topic 4 Creating a bureaucratic empire: the Qin and Han Dynasties (2hours)

Questions for discussion: How does the short-lived Qin Dynasty influence the development of Chinese history? Why is the Han Dynasty called China's first golden age?

Topic 5 Collapse of the Han and disunion without disintegration: the Three Kingdom Period, the Six Dynasties (2hours)

Topic 6 Mid-Term Quiz / Presentation Topic due (2hours)

Topic 7 The Sui/Tang reunification (2hours)

Questions for discussion: Why does the Tang Dynasty mark the zenith of the Chinese empire?

Topic 8 The Five Dynasties and the founding of the Song (2hours)

Questions for discussion: Give your own evaluation of the Song Dynasty.

Topic 9 China in a larger empire: the Yuan/Mongol period (2hours)

Questions for discussion: Were the Mongols heroes or villains?

Topic 10 The Ming Dynasty(2hours)

Questions for discussion: Were the Ming an aborted global empire? **Topic 11** Formation of the Manchu empire: the Qing Dynasty (2hours)

Questions for discussion: Why is the early and middle Qing called another golden age of China? **Topic 12** China in the mid-Qing: tottering at the heights (3hours)

Question for discussion: Explain the reasons for Qing's decline.

Practice (20 hours)

Seminars and in-class discussion: 14 hours In-class self-assessment quizzes: 3 hours Student presentation (group work): 3 hours.

Teaching Methods

Learning activities include mainly lectures, and also film shows, in-class group discussions and exams.

Attendance

Attendance requirements are governed by the "Academic Regulations Governing Bachelor's Degree Programmes of Macao Polytechnic Institute". Students must attend at least 70% of their classes. Those who do not meet the attendance requirements for the course will not be permitted to sit the final and re-sit examination and shall be awarded an 'F' grade.
