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Course Description

This course aims to enhance students' skills and competence in using English in general situations. It will develop students' use of the four language skills (listening, speaking, reading and writing) with heightened emphasis on oral communication skill and writing proficiency at the appropriate level. The course will also focus on Chinese culture and cross-cultural comparisons between students' own countries and China. Extra attention will be given to developing students' pronunciation, specifically individual phoneme recognition and intonation.

Learning Outcomes

After completing the course, students are expected to have strengthened the four language skills at a B1/pre-intermediate level to include, but not be limited to (depending on student needs/wants):

Listening

Listen for gist, specific information and detail using a variety of contexts including—interviews, media reports, and announcements.

Speaking

Practice and develop functional language (making suggestions, exchanging ideas and opinions, expressing likes and dislikes...)

Presentation skills

Pronunciation focus

Reading

Skim for main ideas
Scan for specific information
Infer meaning from context

Pre-writing preparation
Planning for writing
Producing written assignments
