#### **MODULE DESCRIPTION**

Community Health Nursing (CHN) is a population-focused, community-oriented approach aimed at health promotion and health protection of an entire population, and prevention of disease, disability and premature death in a population. In this course, students will learn about the basic concepts and principles of community health nursing, with an emphasis placed in the promotion and protection of health of individuals, family, and the community. Skills of assessing health needs, planning and implementing health promotion and protection activities will be introduced.
