Students are required to complete a report proposal by the end of this module before proceeding to Graduation Report II. Students are equipped with the opportunity to perform research studies under the guidance of their supervisor. Graduation Report I requires students developing research proposal for their research study project. Preliminary considerations relate to selecting an appropriate research topic, design, reviewing the literature to position the proposed study within the existing literature and employing good writing skills and ethical practices.
