Quizzes (20%) and Homework (10%)

Both are graded according to the accuracy of the answers.

Midterm test (20%) and Final Exam(40%)

Midterm test and final exam mainly include four sections: Reading comprehension (20%), Vocabulary (20%) and Grammar (40%), Writing (20%). The first three sections are graded according to the accuracy of the answers, while the writing section is graded according to the following criteria:
