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#### **MODULE DESCRIPTION**

This course aims to motivate a critical reading of literary works by probing formal and aesthetic aspects that are – contrary to popular beliefs – contingent on the realities of life. It seeks to invoke and demonstrate the 'uses' of reading and of literature as a way of thinking, of alerting us to the habituation of language and reality. This involves a reorientation of our understanding of what it means to read – not skimming for information or for the plot or for the titillating 'good parts' of a novel or a political exposé – and to read in a 'literary' way.

Rather than rely on the conventional triptych of fiction, poetry and drama, this course centres instead around some common concerns of and about literature as well as dealing with specific formal aspects of each genre in order to avoid undue emphasis on single particulars over the general, as the weekly breakdown of the course below illustrates.
