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### **MODULE DESCRIPTION**

This module provides English majors an introduction to current theories and research in Applied Linguistics (AL), with emphasis on English as a global language. Students will become acquainted with contemporary development in AL in terms of linguistic, cognitive, environmental and social factors which shape how language, especially a second language, is acquired, in a global context. The module will first introduce students to different approaches to first and second language acquisition. Then students will learn about a range of topics, such as input and interaction, developmental stages, cognitive processes, individual differences, social contexts and cross-linguistic influence, which are necessary to explain various phenomena in learning a second language in a global context.
