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MODULE DESCRIPTION

This module provides students with an overview of basic concepts and theories in general linguistics, giving an overview of the nature of the discipline and some of the controversies which exist within it. This module will cover topics such as phonetics and phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics, pragmatics, sociolinguistics, language variation, (second) language acquisition, discourse analysis, and explore the relations between language and education, culture, and society.

After completing the module, students will have a basic knowledge and understanding of the features of human language and linguistic theories, which will allow them to discuss and explain various linguistic phenomena in core branches of general linguistics.
